Yesterday, you can win tomorrow



PHAB UPDATES

Since our all-staff meeting there have been a few advancements made in the world of PHAB. On 4/28 our 4th year Annual Report was submitted to PHAB and we are awaiting a detailed report on our current progress along with any tips they can provide going into the reaccreditation process. We also finished our Reaccreditation Readiness Assessment that was connected to the Annual Report. This assessment will give us a good idea of what we are to prepare for in the coming months along with answering questions we had for certain measures. Upon completion of the assessment the following breakdown was calculated to show our progress with "prework" review of documents/narratives/plans that our domain teams denoted as "yes", "no", or "unsure of" having. Huge shoutout to those involved in this process – follow-up comments from PHAB will be disseminated to everyone as they are received.

PM/QI:

We are coming up on a year since restarting the PM and QI teams and they have done great work in pushing for projects and key performance indicators! The department currently has **five** active quality improvement projects and 21 approved (18 active) key performance indicators (KPI), which year-over-year, is a 500% (ignoring math) increase in QI projects and 425% increase in active KPIs. In the most recent team meetings, an additional project proposal was submitted by Admin and a new watershed KPI was reviewed.

Strategic Plan:

The Strategic Plan team met recently with the goal of finalizing the list of **stakeholders** to reach out to for vary levels of participation. An email has been crafted that will be sent out to the selected stakeholders to see if they would like to take part in future meetings, be a resource (i.e. community data), or just be provided with progress updates as our plan starts to come together. Further updates will be provided in July!

Community Health:

- Amelia and the QI Committee is finishing QI project instructions, stay tuned!
- Karrey, Lisa, and Haley are conducting 1:1 interviews with the SDOH leadership team.

- Jennifer and Sam hosted CMS at the Joint Entities Meeting to share information on the public health emergency ending. Sarah coordinated with several staff to translate the materials for COVID-19 vaccine and Medicaid. The flyers were distributed widely via mail and digitally. 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EAT SAFE FOOD AFTER A POWER OUTAGE

During a power outage keep your fridge & freezer doors closed

- Food will keep:
 - 4 Hours in a Refrigerator
 - 48 Hours in a FULL freezer
 - 24 Hours in a 1/2 full freezer

After a power outage, never taste food to determine if its safe to eat. Check your food's temperature, anything above 40 degrees F should be thrown away.

If the power has been out MORE than 4 hours, throw out refrigerated foods, including meat, cooked or cut produce, eggs, milk, & soft or shredded cheeses.



Environmental Health:

- 4/1, 4/2, 4/3: Food inspectors checked on establishments in the worst hit areas to ensure power was available. (Hills, Solon, Coralville)
- 4/3: JCPH food program sent out a social media and email blast to establishments on what to do if a restaurant loses power.
- 4/5: EHS I candidate accepted offer. Starts 5/22
- 4/12-4/13: Rob attending FEMA Training-Disaster Management for Water and Wastewater Utilities at the JECC/EMA
- 4/7: Septic pumper inspections (6) completed for FY23
- 4/28: Over 550 Operation Permits went out at the beginning of April and have been coming in all month. These permits are required for systems that incorporate the discharge of treated wastewater in their design. The permit requires a review of the system to help ensure it is continuing to function properly.
- 4/28: Over 100 Use Permits went out at the beginning of April and have been coming in all month. These permits are required for systems that serve commercial property. The permit requires a review of the system to ensure it can continue to serve the specific type of businesses that are located on commercial property.

Word has a readability statistic function!

To turn on:

1. Open File > **Options**
2. Select **Proofing**
3. Under "When Correcting Spelling & Grammar in Word," make sure the "Check Grammar with Spelling" check box is selected.
4. Select "Show Readability Statistics"

It takes two minutes & can help us communicate with our clients better!
