SPOTLIGHT: WATER TESTING

Between historic low water levels, reports of “forever chemicals” & arsenic in well water, and evergreen concerns about nutrient and bacterial contamination, public interest in water quality seems to be reaching a level not seen in perhaps decades. It’s good to know what is in your water and that it is being protected. JCPH’s Watershed Protection Program (WPP) is responsible for just that: protecting the quality of water to ensure optimal health in the County. Taking a complete watershed approach, the largest focuses of the WPP include wells, septic systems, water quality testing, strategic planning, & mosquito surveillance.

The most direct connection between public health & water quality is drinking water. In contrast to public water supplies, private water wells are unregulated; testing or treatment is done at the owner’s request. Groundwater functions like a river with measurable flow, constantly changing conditions, & migration of contaminants. Sinkholes & abandoned or improperly maintained wells provide an entry point for surface contaminants to reach groundwater. The WPP permits water supply wells in the County & administers a state-funded program that provides free well water quality testing as well as subsidizes rehabilitation & plugging.

Proper treatment & disposal of wastewater is imperative to ensuring surface & ground water quality. Improperly maintained or failing septic systems risk contaminating both surface & ground water with harmful bacteria & excessive nutrients. The WPP requires that all dwellings outside of municipal sewerage districts have a properly designed septic system. It affirms the appropriate design, grants permits, oversees the construction, & verifies the mid-life inspection of all septic systems in the County. JoCo is one of the fastest growing counties in the state of Iowa. The WPP collaborates with other County departments like Planning, Development, & Sustainability to ensure that existing wells & septic systems & new rural subdivisions abide by County water quality protection regulations. We also inspect wells that serve campground & other rural gathering places.

Our other programs include the surveillance of the number & species of mosquitos in JoCo for viruses including Zika, West Nile, & La Crosse Encephalitis. This monitoring conducted every spring through fall in collaboration with Iowa State University & the surveillance sites are mainly in public recreation areas throughout the County. In addition to these responsibilities, the WPP also oversees pool & spa inspections.

The Watershed Protection Program is a 3-person team consisting of James Lacina, Jasmine Putnam, & Ethan Turben-Fuhrman.


Dark Blue October 1-31. Light Blue September 1-30, we're up in followers & engagement on Facebook. Instagram is down a little.
