

DIVISION UPDATES

Environmental Health:

- Tim James and Laura Sneller attended the IEHA board meeting and committee mentor workshop in Ankeny, February 8 & 9th
- Laura Sneller volunteered for two committees. The IEHA Scholarship and IPHA conference planning group
- Jesse Bockelman discovered an illegal restaurant operation through social media. Jesse and Ahmed Mohammed went onsite to ensure the facility followed the proper application process and food code compliance requirements. The restaurant ceased operations and is in the process of applying
- Rob Thul and Jesse Bockelman virtually attended AFDO (Association of Food and Drug Officials) Food Safety Bootcamp webinar February 14, 21& 22nd
- Ethan Turben- Fuhrman completed Special Inspections at two Johnson County pools. Special Inspections are enforcement steps taken for pool/spa facilities that are unable or unwilling to correct deficiencies from their annual routine inspection
- Watershed Program Approved updated procedures for Grants To Counties and Tattoo inspections
- Watershed Program will have a contract and program audit of the TNC (Transient non-community well) inspection program with the DNR on February 28th
- Food Program created Policy and Procedures for food facility Plan Reviews
- Food Program developed internal Policy and Procedures for creating and issuing food facility Warning Letters
- Top Chef Iowa City Temp Event took place on February 26th. Tim James and Laura Sneller inspected the 20+ participates for the event

Community Health:

- Nate will be headed to Chicago for the National MRC Summit. Through scholarship, MRC Unit Coordinator's are able to attend to learn best practices, share lessons learned, and network with other Volunteer Managers. The Johnson County Medical Reserve Corps (JCMRC), is the department's volunteer unit that supports the county's response to public health and medical events and emergencies. Nate also attended a planning meeting for the community's full scale exercise this fall with county Emergency Management, law enforcement, first responders, and school districts.
- Several student projects are being coordinated by Jennifer, Amelia, and Rachel. Immunization rates and school districts, Tuberculosis case trends and developing a tabletop exercise are among the projects being planned this semester. Several other students have been recruited to support other projects in the Division like the Opioid Settlement Assessment with Lisa. The DPS squad also had two active cases recently convert through directly observed therapy (DOT). DOT is a time intensive process to convert active cases to a status of no longer being infectious and dependent on compliance and the treatment regimen.
- Lisa will be coordinating the KEYS Dementia program for a second time this Winter/Spring. The KEYS Dementia program was initially a pilot program by the YMCA in Des Moines and former Medical Director and State Epidemiologist. The program utilizes subject matter experts and volunteers to educate older adults on dementia prevention practices.
- Giselle provided updates to the Board of Health and offering other county departments and offices to review their worker WellBQ data. Every two years, the Health Planner, undertakes assessing the entire county's workforce utilizing the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health WellBQ survey. Shout out Laura, Giselle's Employee Wellness intern that has supported analysis and design of portions of the WellBQ report.
- In January the SDOH team, Karrey, Lisa, Jamie, and Haley, completed the final work product for the grant and recently received feedback from the CDC. The team will present updates to the Board later in the Spring. At the February Board of Health meeting, an Request For Action for funding through the AARP was sought to support coalition training. Ultimately the goal will be to seek and secure funding to continue building a Community Health Worker Program to support the areas of concern and priorities of the community Leadership Team.
- Rachel was awarded the NACCHO scholarship for the Certificate of Infection Control to pursue credentialing. The CIC is the standardized measure of the basic knowledge, skills and abilities expected of professionals working in the field of infection prevention and control. The initial passing rate is 58.4% There are 8,617 certified professionals in over 40 countries. Amelia was awarded and achieved certification last year. Congrats again Amelia, and good luck, Rachel!
- Jamie and Sam met with the City of Iowa City to discuss health benefits of household appliance improvements and other initiatives that support climate friendly practices and air quality. The initial conversations are related to the work that units of government are participating in through the inflation reduction act.



Despite all the snow days and weather disruptions the IS@S program saw 119 children, providing them with Oral hygiene instructions, dental nutrition education, provided 117 children with fluoride varnish, 82 of those children received at least 1 sealant, 707 total sealants were placed. 86 of the 119 were moderate risk for decay (so no decay present), 33 were high risk- so decay was found. We finished our 10th school as well.




